EARLY LIFE

Mar 19, 1898

Born in Toronto, Ontario to Thomas and Annie (Lascelles) Chapman. He was the younger brother of ***George Frederick Chapman***.

Lived in Toronto, Ontario with Thomas Chapman (head of house – father, age 34), Annie Chapman (mother, age 30), George “Fred” Chapman (brother, age 5) and Muriel Chapman (sister, age 1).

1911 Census

Age 13

Lived in King, Ontario with Thomas Chapman (head of house – father, age 44), Annie Chapman (mother, age 41), George “Fred” Chapman (brother, age 15), Muriel Chapman (sister, age 11), Gordon Chapman (brother, age 7) and Arthur Powell (hired help, age 25).

Age 60


Frank died at Sunnybrook Hospital in Toronto, Ontario. He is buried at Nobleton Cemetery in Nobleton, Ontario.

In World War I, there was one girl from the Nobleton district who went Overseas, Mary Agar. She spent three years in the Hospitals there. Two of the boys from this district were killed in action, Mathew Agar, and William Chamberlain. The boys who went Overseas from these parts were the following: Mathew Agar; Leonard Atkinson; Walter McCutcheon; Reuben Dobson; Albert Snider; Albert Hill; Lyle Stewart; Wesley Woods; Hugh Sheardown; William Chamberlain; Chris. Chamberlain; Loftus Jewitt; Fred Chapman; and Frank Chapman.

On the return of these boys, a celebration was held in Nobleton. During the day, a Field Day was held at Hills Farm with many in attendance. In the evening a banquet was held for Mary Agar and the returned boys and their parents in the Hall. Also in the evening, a concert was held in the old Skating Rink and watches were presented to the returned folks. Mr. Walter McCutcheon was spokesman for the boys.

In 1942 he retired from farming and moved to Nobleton where he had a small garden and kept a few pigs until he died in 1957 at the age of ninety. His wife pre-deceased him in 1937. They had three sons and one daughter: Fred, Frank, Muriel and Gordon. Both Fred and Frank served during World War One in France and Russia. There are eleven grandchildren, thirteen great grandchildren and four great-great grandchildren.

Frank married the former Olive Hill and they lived in Nobleton until his death in August 1958. They had three children: Mary (Mrs. F. Ball), and Jim and Larry at home. They also had a son Peter who died in infancy.
