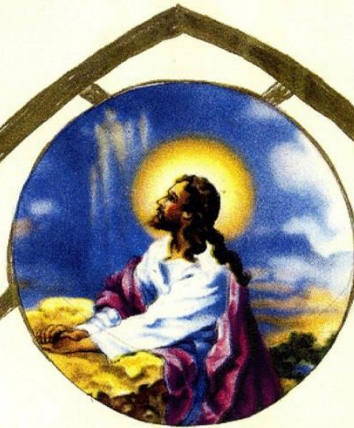
Age 20

When the great European War broke as a bolt from the blue, in 1914, many of the young men in and around Schomberg signed up and went overseas to take part in maintaining the principle upheld by the allied nations of the world. Many of these returned but many made the supreme sacrifice.

As a memorial to these unreturning brave, a monument was erected in the Agricultural Grounds. On this monument are engraved the following names:

Pte. Doyle Bayoneted in Leg. PTE. MAXWELL C. P. DOYLE,

who is reported wounded, is of Dublin birth and came to this country when a boy. He was attending school in Schomberg before he enlisted with a Toronto unit in March, 1915. His sister at 22 North street has received word that he has received a bayonet wound in the leg. He was 18-years old on June 22nd and was wounded on the 14th of the month. His father is at present in England, a private in the 76th Battalion.

Pte. M. Doyle. 74th Battalion almost a year ago. Before this he had been attending the Schomberg, Ont. High School. He went overseas in March, and had been in the trenches about four months. His father, John M. Doyle, is bandsman in the 76th Battalion. Pte. Maxwell Boyle is a grandson of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Radford, 17 Norfolk street.

"Somewhere in France," according to word received by his mother, Mrs. John M. Doyle of 110 Margueretta st. In June Pte. Doyle celebrated his 18th birthday in the hospital, having been wounded by a bayonet in the leg. The fallen soldier enlisted in Toronto with the 74th Battalion
