GLADSTONE LLOYD is one of Schomberg's leading young business men. He is the son of Alf. Lloyd, of Loyalist descent, of Lloydtown. Gladstone obtained his education at Lloydtown public school, Schomberg continuation school, Newmarket high school and one year at S.P.S., Toronto. The War interrupted his college career, for he enlisted in August, 1915, and went overseas in December of that year. He was wounded at Courcellette, October 25, 1916, and was sent to England till September, 1917, when he returned to France, to be soon sent back to Blighty. He came to Canada to the hospital in April, 1919, remaining in Christie Street till 1922, having spent over five years in the hospitals. However, he has made a miraculous recovery. From Toronto, he went to Alliston to a chicken farm for two years, and, in 1924, came to Schomberg as postmaster. He is also an agent for the Sun Life Assurance. He is an adherent of the United Church and, in politics, is a Liberal.

A prominent figure in village activity, Mr. Lloyd for many years was a local sports promoter and was actively associated with Schomberg's baseball clubs -He-was a member of the Lions club, the Union Masonic lodge, a former secretarytreasurer of the school board for 20 yeas, and a member of the United church. He had earlier served as a village commissioner and was a former chief of the local fire department.

Surviving are his widow, the former Mildred Ferguson; two sons. Blake, stationed with the R.C.A.F. at Summerside, P.E.I., and Grant, at home; and two daughters, Betty and Sheila, at home; his parents, and a sister, Mrs. Harry Carter of Schomberg.
