The living room where the ceremony was performed was decorated with June flowers, palms and ferns. The bride, who was given away by her father, wore a lovely gown of white crepe romaine. Her veil of net was caught back by a band of orange blossoms and she carried a shower bouquet of pink roses and lily of the valley. The bridesmaid, Miss Helen Grove, wore a frock of pale pink taffeta, faced with pale lavender, with lavender flowers at shoulder and hip. Her bouquet was of pink pyrethrum and white and purple larkspur. The groom was attended by Mr. Russell McQueen and Mr. Robert Malcolm played the wedding music. Following the ceremony, Mr. and Mrs. Kitchen, the groom's sister, Mrs. Extence and Mr. Extence of Toronto received with the bride and groom. Early in the evening Mr. and Mrs. McCutcheon left for Toronto and on by boat to Quebec city and up the Saguenay river to Dalbeau, where they will reside in future. For traveling Mrs. McCutcheon wore a smart frock of rose beige, a beige kasha suede coat and close-fitting beige felt hat. Guests were present from Toronto, Brantford, Hamilton and Detroit.
