> WORLD WAR I 1914--1918.

In World War I, there was one girl from the Nobleton district who went Overseas, Mary Agar. She spent three years in the Hospitals there. Two of the boys from this district were killed in action, Mathew Agar, and William Chamberlain. The boys who went Overseas from these parts were the following:Mathew Agar; Leonard Atkinson; Walter McCutcheon; Reuben Dobson; Albert Snider; Albert Hill; Lyle Stewart; Wesley Woods; Hugh Sheardown; William Chamberlain; Chris. Chamberlain; Loftus Jewitt; Fred Chapman; and Frank Chapman.

On the return of these boys, a celebration was held in Nobleton. During the day, a Field Day was held at Hills Farm with many in attendance. In the evening a banquet was held for Mary Agar and the returned boys and their parents in the Hall. Also in the evening, a concert was held in the old Skating Rink and watches were presented to the returned folks. Mr. Walter McCutcheon was spokesman for the boys.

This board cleaned the old cemetery to its proper condition, but the project was unfortunately not followed through. Still under the Institute, another public meeting was held on June 7, 1954 and Gordon Broad was elected as the president of the new Cemetery Board. He was assisted by Lyman Davis, Gilbert Faris, Fred Ascott, Howard Wellar, Hugh Sheardowne, and Harold Rose. These men each donated one hundred dollars in order to have the grounds surveyed and new burial plots set aside. In addition, approximately one half an acre was donated By Thomas Dodson in 1954 and as well the Board purchased more property from the Estate of the late Thomas Breedon to increase the area of the new Cemetery.

Suspect turns self in after hit-run mishap

OAK RIDGES Downsview man has been charged with failing to remain at the scene of an accident after turning himself in to Ontario Provincial Police here last week

Robert Mitchell Harvey, 19, of Wilson Ave., Downsview, was charged as the result of a hitand-run accident July 24 east of Schomberg.

Mr. Mitchell turned himself in Thursday evening through his lawyer.

Hugh Sheardown, 79, of R. R. 1 Schomberg, suffered serious injuries in that mishap when struck by a green Ford pickup truck on Highway 9 east of Schomberg.

He was reported in guarded condition in York County Hospital's Intensive Care unit Monday

OPP said Monday that they were preparing to check registration records for all light green Ford trucks registered in the province in an attempt to find the wanted vehicle.

also reported They "numerous calls" from the public reporting vehicles matching the description of the wanted truck.

"Many concerned and public minded citizens con-iacted the police who in-vestigated all information received," OPP officials said Monday.

They noted that had the driver of the vehicle stopped at the time of the accident, no charges would have been laid. Mr. Harvey will appear in Newmarket Provincial Court

NEWMARKET - The driver of a hit-and-run vehicle which fatally injured a 79-year-old Schomberg man was fined \$100 and given 60 days to pay in provincial court here last week. Robert Mitchell Harvey, 19, of Downsview, had pleaded

guilty last month to a charge of failing to remain at the scene of an accident.

On the day of Mr. Harvey's guilty plea, Hugh Sheardown of R. R. I, Schomberg, died in York County Hospital of injuries suffered in the July 24 mishap on Hwy. 9, west of Hwy. 27.
